

# **Generator Safety**

## **USE BACKUP POWER SAFELY**

Portable and standby generators are a great option to provide backup power during power outages, **when used properly**.

#### Safe Use of Portable Generators

- Always keep generators at least **20 ft away** from your home.
- Never operate a generator in an enclosed space, including in an attached garage.
- ➤ Make sure the generator has **3-4 ft clearance** on all sides to ensure proper ventilation.
- **Keep away** from doors, windows and vents.
- Exhaust should always be directed away from your home.
- Always use grounded cords and inspect cords for damage prior to use.
- Always use GFCI protection.
- Use proper cord for wattage being used.
- Never refuel a generator while it is on or while it is hot.

## Carbon Monoxide (CO) POISONING PREVENTION

- Improper use and installation of generators could cause CO poisoning
- ➤ Make sure your home has carbon monoxide alarms outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home

### **Permanent Generator Requirements**

A Washoe County building permit is required for **permanent**, **non-portable** generators.

#### Requirements for Washoe County permit\*:

- Application
- > Site plan
- Electrical drawing (single line diagram)
- ➤ Manufacturer's specs of generator
- > Transfer switch specifications
- Installation by a qualified professional
